


Apart from Haytor, the organizers have selected two other interesting climbs in the last part of some stages: The Struggle in the 2^{nd} and Cat and Fiddle in the 3rd. We've choosen Haytor, because it's the only uphill finish and it is likely to give the final general classification, as it's situated in the end of stage 6 (out of 8).



The stage 6 in 2 pictures:







Haytor-East means an elevation gain of 363m / 6.8km (2,7 7,1 7,3 7,4 6,1 2,3 and 6.8% in the last 500m, from Bovey Tracey. The best climbers will probably try to escape in the 4th km, where they'll find the highest gradient: 300m at 12% (from km3,4 to 3,7).
